In launching the Hartford Institute, we sought to engage the nursing profession to fully embrace geriatric practice and the health care sector to fully recognize nursing excellence as an essential component in caring for older adults. Today, the importance of geriatric nursing — amid an aging population and national nursing shortage — is widely acknowledged.

As this timeline makes clear, so much has changed in one decade! 
